Ensuring a level of consistency across Australian health providers, a number of the DIAS Standards have been derived from the NSQHS Standards. Standards which are prominent in both frameworks include

- Patient ID
- Procedure Matching
- Medication Management, and
- · Consumer Engagement.

#### **NSQHS Standards (second edition)**


Accreditation against the National Safety and Quality Health Service (NSQHS) Standards (second edition) commenced on 1 January 2019.

The second edition comprises a streamlined eight standards and 148 actions compared to the first edition's ten standards and 256 actions.
